We are not all in the same boat, but we are all caught in the same storm.

Perhaps you have read this or something similar on social media or somewhere else. It names an important truth about our current reality; namely, we have all been impacted by the pandemic, but not all in the same ways. We have had varying levels of isolation, and faced a range of challenges in working inperson, remotely, or not at all. We have all had harder and easier weeks, but not necessarily at the same time.

In a way, there is an aspect of this reality that is true in all seasons of life, whether living in the midst of a pandemic or not. Consider, for instance, our spiritual journeys. We each may have vibrant seasons and dry seasons, but not necessarily at the same time. There are times when we are resonating with others through deep conversation, Bible studies, book studies, or the words of engaging authors; and then there are times when we sense we are not. Still in ways, woven into community, we are there for one another. Still in ways, God is there for us, whether felt or not.

Now in this moment, we may sense that we are on the verge of moving out of the pandemic. We are not quite out of the storm yet, though with the ever increasing number of vaccinated persons (and the increasing traffic levels) we can feel it abating. We understand that we will soon be living into the reality of whatever the "new normal" of a post-pandemic world looks like, I invite you to consider what that might mean for you on your spiritual journey. *Will you attend worship regularly?* In person or remote? Note that whenever we do officially reopen (to be determined by the reopening team), our plan is to continue to stream worship services via Facebook Live.

Along with worship, what about other ancient and enduring Christian practices? Like prayer? Or the sacred art of saying "No," (otherwise known as sabbath keeping)?

If you sense it is time in your spiritual journey to more deeply explore these and/or other traditional Christian practices I highly recommend the following book:

Soul Feast, An Invitation to the Christian Spiritual Life, by Marjorie J. Thompson

This is a beautifully written book, a spiritual classic, filled with traditional Christian practices and wisdom. If you do purchase a copy, perhaps for summer reading, do get the newly revised edition (2014) . Also, although it is not difficult to read, I have found that like good food, it is best savored, read at a slow place. I recently read it in small bites, during early morning hours over many weeks. If you do read it, I would be delighted to have conversation with you about it; simply email me.

Why this? Why now? Because as the storm of the pandemic abates and we move into a "World of Reopening," there may be increased demands, unexpected challenges, and spiritual dangers. To be regrounded in God, reformed into the image of Christ, and re-inspired by the Holy Spirit is the soul's best way forward.

Worship Update

Saturdays: We will continue to offer worship in the parking lot at 4:30 pm on Saturdays through July 24. Note that, in line with CDC recommendations, **masks are now optional**. We do ask that you continue to be courteous to others around you who choose to continue to wear a face mask and remain socially distant.

Sundays: **Summer** worship time changes to **9:30 am on July 4.** We continue with Sunday virtual worship at:

- 10:30 am through June 27
- 9:30 am beginning on July 4

Note that Facebook Live services are available at the time of airing or anytime after. So although we will begin worship at 9:30 beginning July 4, you will still be able to watch at 10:30 or any time after.

Wednesdays: Given staff vacation schedules, we have taken a break from Wednesday evening prayer for the summer. We hope to resume in September.

Reopening Decisions: The church council has formed a "Reopening Team" who will begin meeting in June to make decisions about reopening. Team members include: Jennifer Lambert, Pastor Maehl, Beth Melillo, Cynthia Niiler, Catherine Pinch, Ann Sjodin, and Julie Weeden.

Capital Campaign Beginnings

For roughly two years, the church council has been considering the timing for a Capital Campaign that would address the following major items:

- Necessary repairs to the church tower (Cost estimate \$150,000 to \$200,000)
- Renovation of the Pearson Room
- Update to sanctuary carpets/flooring.

The council believes it is now time to explore the possibility of a campaign with the rest of the congregation.

In May, the council had a very fruitful conversation with Pastor Renee Liabraaten from Renaissance Consulting. Some of you may remember that she led a successful capital campaign for us in 2010. Thanks to an anonymous gift, we have contracted with Pastor Renee to lead a preparatory phase to a Capital Campaign that is centered on crafting, communicating, and clarifying a vision.

This phase will begin in September. At that time we expect to be prepared to share:

- A preliminary vision for a renovated Pearson Room developed by architect Brad Nederhoff.
- Details of tower repairs
- A preliminary vision for updates to the sanctuary flooring prepared by the Interior Care Team.

Pastor Liabraaten will be present for several days in September and will be conducting approximately 30 interviews with households in the congregation along with 2-3 focus groups. The purpose of these interviews and focus groups will be to share the vision, garner feedback in order to clarify the vision, and determine whether or not there is broad support in the congregation. If it is clear that we are prepared to move forward with a capital campaign, then we will do so.

I ask that you keep our congregation in your prayers; and I offer my thanks to the anonymous donor who has financed this preparatory phase of the process.

One of my favorite portions of scripture is the wedding at Cana in John's Gospel. After John's cosmic explanation of Jesus, God incarnate,

At the same time, over the past several weeks, I have been able to experience moments of community that resonated with the wedding at Cana. After more than a year, this past Saturday, we gathered as a community for worship and fellowship as we enjoyed food and drink and nothing less than the presence of God. During a week of above-average heat, I was able to visit some seniors. The least I could do was bring ice cream on a hot day! I can not forget mentioning gathering with our confirmation youth and their families to celebrate public affirmation of their baptisms! Thank God for getting this pandemic under control and being able to see these members of our community!

It has been a joy to share in these times as a community where God has been present even in our scatteredness and distance. As God has promised, God has and will continue to bring us back into the beloved community to care for one another, to enjoy fellowship and fun, to be in deep and abiding relationships. I give thanks to God for this community, a community that gifts this world radical hospitality, mutual care, and holding space for all people to simply be.

Intern Update

Vicar Wylie's last weekend with us will be July 24-25. Vicar Wylie will be preaching at both the Saturday afternoon (parking lot) and Sunday morning (virtual) worship services. Hopefully the weather will cooperate on Saturday so that we can share food and celebrate their ministry among us after worship.

Nelson Board Update

As reported in our May newsletter, the Nelson Board is in the process of purchasing an apartment building that abuts the church on Eddy Street. Thankfully, the process continues to move forward. We now have full approval for \$420,000 in Community Preservation funds, (voted on by the Waltham City Council on May 10). The next steps (being actively worked on) are to secure a \$500,000 mortgage and to work with the Waltham legal department to draft language that would indicate that the four units in the apartment building will be kept affordable in perpetuity. Please continue to keep this process in your prayers.
