Welcome and Inclusion

We are at the beginning of a process leading toward us crafting a formal statement of welcome and inclusion; as hundreds of other congregations have

done. We as a church council had planned on beginning this process in 2020, but when the pandemic hit and we were no longer meeting in person, we chose to wait until now. Here is a brief overview of our anticipated process:

- 1. Over the next two months, we will be sharing information: in newsletters, forums, and via email.
- 2. Beginning with the Justice and Service team we will start crafting a welcome statement, drawing upon examples from other churches.
- 3. Our welcome statement will be shared with the congregation and there will be opportunity for feedback, editing, and amending.
- 4. Eventually we will have a statement that will be voted on at a congregational meeting. Once voted, this statement will then be registered with an organization called Reconciling Works, making our explicit welcome public.

Refugee Resettlement

An exploratory meeting via zoom Wednesday, October 26, 7:00 pm

We are beginning to explore the possibility of joining with 2 other Lutheran congregations in our area to resettle a refugee family in collaboration with Ascentria Care Alliance (formerly Lutheran Social Services). To do this, each congregation would need to identify 5-8 people to serve on a Neighborhood Support Team. The roughly 20-person Neighborhood Support team would then work together to organize fundraising efforts, find housing, build relationships, help navigate school enrollment, and more.

There will be an informational meeting on Wednesday, October 26, at 7:00 pm held via zoom for people in the three congregations who are interested in learning more about the process (with no obligation to commit to anything). A zoom link will be shared closer to the event via email.

If we do discern that God is calling us to move forward with this, it would be a means for God to work through us in blessing a new American family, nurturing relationships among several congregations, and weaving us more deeply into mission of healing, holding, and homecoming.

Sunday School Prayers Requested

COVID has effect us deeply, making life more complicated and demanding for many people, including many parents. When the pandemic shutdown began in March of 2020 we suspended Sunday school. Beginning in Septem-

ber of 2022, we have been striving to resume; but now in a modified, more collaborative way.

Now, we are putting all of the children together in a one room schoolhouse model, and instead of trying to find one or two teachers who will commit to teaching every Sunday, we are seeking many adults and youth who are willing to teach once or a few times a semester. In other words, we are seeking to share the joys and challenges, the blessings and responsibilities more broadly.

For this, I am now asking your help. First, please pray! Please pray for our children and their faith formation. Please pray for those who are discerning whether or not to teach and how often. Please pray that those who do offer to teach will be granted strength and insight, and will experience blessings themselves.

Then too, I ask for those of you in a position to do so to consider helping. Might you be willing to teach a class once or a few times? If so, we have links to online curriculum, many costumes for reenacting stories, art supplies, helpers, and more. Also, if teaching feels like too much of a stretch, might you be willing to help out occasionally as another adult or youth in the room when someone else is leading? (And if there is a youth in your household might you encourage them to share their gifts in this way).

I pray the Holy Spirit will be part of our collective discernment, that we will adapt to new models of enacting essential ministries, and that God will helps us fulfill our responsibility to pass on the faith to new generations.

During the week of Sept. 19, I had the opportunity to travel back to my seminary in Co-

lumbus, OH for my week-long intensive course. Each semester I take one course as a part of my Master of Divinity program at Trinity Lutheran Seminary, which allows me to be on internship for two years here at FLC.

This semester, my intensive course was called Theological Leadership. Throughout the week, we spent our days in class exploring the challenges and opportunities for theological leadership in the twenty-first century, particularly during this time of pandemic. This exploration took place through the lens of hope. We wrestled with the distinctions between optimism and hope, how the opposite of hope is despair, and how the presence or absence of hope shapes our capacity for leadership.

One of my biggest takeaways from the course was starting every class session with a story about hope from one of my classmates. Each one of the stories, from classmates finding something that was once lost to them sharing poems that carried them through devastating losses, brought tears to my eyes. With so much despair and injustice in the world, these glimpses of God's movement in the world gave me hope. Throughout the week, what I found is that hope is a gift, given to us by God that we get to share with one another. Hope cannot be achieved alone; it must be an act of community, one that will not disappoint us (Romans 5:5).



Office Repairs: We have selected a contractor and hope work might begin this fall to replace the flat roof over the offices. This roof has been leaking and we know that we will need to do some mold remediation once the new roof is installed. Also, we will be replacing the outsized and outdated air conditioning unit. The old AC provided cooling for the church offices. We are planning on installing a unit big enough to provide cooling for the offices and the Pearson Room, and have learned that this will require substantial electrical work. this major project we are using significant Capital Improvement Funds.
