On Saturday, March 4 a group of 12 church council members gathered for a four hour retreat. Our ultimate goal was not to plan more events or activities, but to listen for the guidance of the Holy

Spirit. We began with a series of seven questions including these two: "How are things with you and God?" and "How are things with First Lutheran and God?"

There is not space to report out everything from our rich discussions. I will simply note that what strongly emerged was a sense that we are blessed, with much more positives than negatives; that our tending to relationships is very important; and that in the wake of the pandemic we are truly in a time of transition.

Toward the end of our time together, we engaged a process that would help us identify a Bible story that we sense is connected to our story right now. What emerged is the following passage from the Exodus narrative:

When Pharaoh let the people go, God did not lead them by way of the land of the Philistines, although that was nearer; for God thought, 'If the people face war, they may change their minds and return to Egypt.' So God led the people by the roundabout way of the wilderness towards the Red Sea. The Israelites went up out of the land of Egypt prepared for battle. And Moses took with him the bones of Joseph, who had required a solemn oath of the Israelites, saying, 'God will surely take notice of you, and then you must carry my bones with you from here.' They set out from Succoth, and camped at Etham, on the edge of the wilderness. The LORD went in front of them in a pillar of cloud by day, to lead them along the way, and in a pillar of fire by night, to give them light, so that they might travel by day and by night. Neither the pillar of cloud by day nor the pillar of fire by night *left its place in front of the people. (Exodus 13:17-22)*

- **7:30 pm in person and FB Live -** A service with optional individual absolution, communion, and stripping of the alter for Good Friday.





Walking Together in God's Love

During our confirmation class last Sunday, we got to talking about this word that Lutherans like to use often, and that

word is: GRACE. As a class, we all had heard this word used often, particularly at church. But when it came down to us defining 'grace,' we struggled to articulate what grace really means. And might that be true for so many of us today, too? We use the word 'grace' often, but what does it really mean?

In our class we turned to the Rev. Nadia Bolz-Weber for some guidance. During the 2018 Youth Gathering in Houston, TX, Rev. Nadia gave a talk on grace, in which she said, "I wish someone had told the 15-year-old me what grace was. Because grace isn't some fluffy, theological word that sounds good but really means nothing. Grace is the way in which God is like the great heavenly composter, making beautiful things out of total feces."

Grace, as Rev. Nadia preaches, is when our tears turn to joy, when our own pain is a balm for those who also hurt, and when our failings are redeemed into something beautiful through the love of God. We experience the gift of grace through others and God in our lives; and maybe that's why grace can be challenging to define. Grace is a God's free gift of love that we didn't do anything to earn. I heard someone say once, grace is like when you adopt a dog. The dog becomes a part of your family and there was nothing your dog did to earn it. Your family chose the dog, just like God chooses us, over and over again, no matter what.

After listening to Rev. Nadia speak, our class decided that grace was much deeper than we had originally thought. It wasn't just about feeling good. It is about God's deep love for us that is freely given – and it is for everyone.

Family Resettlement

In an earlier newsletter we reported that members of First Lutheran Church, Lutheran Church of the Newtons, and St. Paul Lutheran Church, in Arlington have formed a 25 person Neighborhood Support Team (NeST) to accompany a family being resettled in our area through Ascentria Care Alliance (formerly Lutheran Social Services of New England).

On February 21st, team leaders finally got to meet our "match"—a family of 4 from Haiti mother, father, and two young children—who are in the United States seeking asylum. Over the next two weeks members of the housing subcommittee secured an apartment in our area and were able to furnish it through donations. On Saturday, March 4 the family was thrilled to move in.

Over the coming months we are looking to raise upwards of \$25,000 (potentially more) across our 3 collaborating congregations in order to pay rent and other expenses for the first year. I invite you to re-read this passage from Exodus and note the following:

- If God is leading us on a roundabout path, it is for our own benefit.
- Trusting that God is leading us, we need not prepare ourselves for battle.
- We carry with us something of our ancestors in the faith (this is part of our calling)
- God protected the Israelites with a cloud to block the heat of the sun by day, and a pillar of fire for light, protection, and warmth at night. God is protecting, enlightening, and warming us too.
- God's not leaving us.

Then if you are able, prayerfully consider how these themes are playing out in your own life:

- Can you trust that God is leading you, even if it seems to be a roundabout way?
- Despite the challenges and dangers of life, can you resist any urge to be (figuratively) "preparing for battle?"
- What of your ancestors in the faith do you carry with you? Is carrying this part of your call?
- Can you identify ways God is actively protecting, enlightening, shading and/or warming your life?

I will conclude with a call and a hope-filled prayer. The call that you might continue to engage the ministry of First Lutheran during this time of great social transition. The hope-filled prayer that the God who has brought you thus far along the way, will deepen your sense that what was true for the Israelites of old is true for us; namely, that God is not leaving us.
