Earlier this week, I attended a meeting at McLean Psychiatric Hospital in Belmont, MA. It is the number one ranked psychiatric hospital in the country, known both for its programs

and for its research.

One of my learnings from the day was that there has been a good deal of research on spirituality and mental illness. At one point in our conversation, the facilitator handed out 20 note cards, each with one piece of data related to that research. Here is what was written on two of those cards:

Church attendance & active religion were found to be protective to vulnerability for depression.

Parents who were more involved in church activities were more likely to have harmonious marital relationships and better parenting skills. This in turn enhanced kids' competence, self-regulation, psychosocial adjustment and school performance.

This of course does not mean that participation in church guarantees mental health and harmonious relationships, but I believe it does over time deepen and strengthen us.

I am aware that many in our community are carrying heavy burdens. I encourage you to keep inviting God into your joys and struggles, and let the worship, prayer, and community of First Lutheran be part of that. On Sunday December 3, we begin a new liturgical year with the first Sunday of Advent. We will light the candles and prepare for the coming of Christ at Christmas; but also for Jesus coming along side of us now, amid all the struggles and challenges of life: physical, spiritual, and emotional. Whether in-person or on-line, I urge you to join us.

mary of the response:

- We received 49 pledges totaling \$299,403
- Last year we received 49 pledges totaling \$312, 110

Stewardship Update

This fall we engaged in our annual stewardship

- Due to people dying, moving, or finding themselves needing to reduce their pledge there were decreases of \$36,994 from those who pledged for 2023.
- Thanks to new and greater pledges there were increases of \$26,487 for 2024.
- This leaves us \$10,507 behind last year.

Looking at the numbers above I find myself filled with gratitude at the abundance. Yes, there is a bit of a deficit and that will be a bit of a challenge; however notice, we could have had a huge deficit and we do not. I give thanks for all who were willing and able to make commitments!!

December Appeal

In response to the deficit noted above, the Church Council is inviting contributions toward a December Appeal. A letter is being drafted that will be sent to a wider audience than those active church members who receive invitations to pledge. We hope that those in our virtual community, those who receive our newsletter, and those within our active membership who have the means will consider making a contribution.

Thanks be to God who gives us all we have, who then invites us to share in the ministry of the church where through worship and prayer, serving our neighbors and sharing our resources, Christ Jesus is at work: nurturing faith, deepening relationships, and blessing us and others.

Late-Fall Greetings,

Advent is a peculiar time, both on our calendars and theologically. We feel it in our bodies, as our planet tilts those of us in the northern hemisphere away from the sun's light and warmth. The winter solstice is coming close now - a time of the year when the boundary between earth and the heavens feels so "thin" - these long nights more often than not bring a deep dis-ease to my spirit. Yet, this anxiety is only one half of the picture. Advent is a time of anticipation, but for me that anticipation is two-fold. Half is the anxiety and worry I have already named. Advent is a time of seeing the world's brokenness something which has caused every generation for millennia to look at Advent's end-time texts and think, "this must be it". The tragedy in Gaza, Ukraine, rising authoritarianism, stubborn inflation – vou hear the pundits and see the headlines. The end feels ever-near.

But what sort of ending?

Because the other side of Advent anticipation is warm excitement. It is the mystery of a coming Savior declared by his mother, a teenage refugee - it is her voice rising in song, declaring that the evils of this world will break against God's love. The other side of Advent is anticipating rich food with dear friends and family. It is anticipating laughs, games, and music. It is warm glow of fire, gold-Christmas-lights-on-tinsel, and sparkling light through bubbly champagne. The anticipation of Advent is anticipation of deep and joyful fellowship amid anticipation of the dark embrace of longest night. In that embrace there is an ending, but that ending is not cold and fear-filled, it is welcoming into our broken world a Savior whose loving-kindness changes everything. It is coming closer now - let us wait for it together.
