Do you not know that in a race the runners all compete, but only one receives the prize? Run in such a way that you may win it. Athletes exercise selfcontrol in all things; they do it to receive a perishable garland, but we an imperishable one.

(1 Corinthians 9:24-25)

I recently came across this passage in my devotional reading. Paul is clearly using an athletic metaphor to talk about the importance of discipline on our faith journeys. When I read it, I thought to myself, "This is good and true, and at the same time Paul is missing something."

What is good and true is that discipline does matter. Discipline does, after all, share a root with the word disciple; and Jesus did instruct his followers to, "Go make disciples."

We are part of a faith tradition that keeps time in a liturgical way. On February 14, we begin our annual 40 day season of Lent. Like in every year, the Church calls for us to turn more closely toward God, paying more attention to that which pulls us away from love of God and love of neighbor. This takes a measure of discipline.

If mindless or numbing behaviors pull us away, Lent is a time to give one up. If bitterness or resentment is too often eating away at our insides, Lent is a season to strive to let it go. If there is something dangerous that you are putting in your body, (via mouth, ears, eyes), with Lent comes the impassioned call to go cold-turkey.

There is nothing demanded in all of this, nothing required, just the invitation to seek increased intentionality; to making our faith journey more central, when the world keeps calling us to keep it more peripheral. Like eating vegetables, this is good for us and we know it. Paul knows it too. What Paul does not know is that for the runner there is more than one prize. Paul would have been familiar with competitive running as the first Olympics were held hundreds of years earlier in 776 BCE. But Paul, having been raised to be a devout Jewish religious leader would never have been a runner himself.

I was once a competitive runner, and know of the physical discipline Paul refers to; and, yes, in each race there is only one winner. However, in my experience to be part of a caring group of teammates, training together, encouraging one another, celebrating a whole variety of victories (not just one's own) that is the true prize.

Thanks be to God who keeps welcoming us back whenever we turn; and thanks be to God for the gift of community, for other people to run and train with, to encourage and be encouraged by, to grieve the losses and celebrate the victories. That's the true prize. Keep running your race. Blessed Lent, Pastor Maehl

Winter greetings!

I mentioned in worship this week that the first day of February marked the six-

month milestone of my internship with you all. As often happens – it is hard for me to believe that much time has already gone by! However, with this halfway point a significant piece of my internship experience has arrived – I have begun working on my internship project! The project centers on social rhythms and dynamics within the congregation after all the changes and chaos that have come with the pandemic.

What kinds of relationships and discipleship opportunities are we looking for here at First Lutheran? What does it mean to meet not only for worship, but to nourish and foster community along with our faith? These are the kinds of questions that are driving my project, which will be composed of two interlocking pieces. For the first component, I'll be leading a group of young adults in a few sessions of Dungeons & Dragons over the next few months; my hope is that we'll have the chance to better get to know one another, while experimenting with a new way of gathering.

The second component will consist of me designing and distributing a survey for the whole congregation. It will involve intentional conversations with some folks to help me discern questions for the survey itself, followed by distribution and then assessment of the results. The primary hopes of this half of the project will be both for me to gain experience in this kind of work, but also to gather a useful body of information for the ongoing life of community and discipleship in the church. After gathering a small team to look at the results, the plan will be to host some kind of fellowship event or opportunity using the feedback from the First Lutheran community.

I welcome any questions, feedback, or input as I begin this work, so please don't hesitate to reach out to me over the next few months!

Annual Meeting Update

Our annual meeting was held on Sunday, January 28, highlights include:

Budget: We voted a budget of \$359,430; a 2.3% increase over last year. This budget includes continuing our practice of tithing our income to the wider church (10%) and giving another 1% for local benevolence. We also provided a 5% raise to staff.

2023 Accomplishments include:

- The efforts of the NeST Neighborhood Support Team in their efforts to resettle an asylum seeking family originally from Haiti. We gave thanks for those who have served as tutors and drivers, and for those who have served on the education, health care, transportation, and other teams.
- Having voted to become a Reconciling in Christ congregation last year, the Justice and Service Team continued to work on expanding our public witness through participation in a Waltham Pride event and increased signage. The team also planned conversations and watch parties in order that we might continue our work of addressing issues of systemic racism.

2024 Goals Include:

- Gathering support for sending youth and chaperones to the ELCA National Youth Gathering in July of 2024.
- Continued work together with Lutheran congregations in Arlington and Newton on resettlement efforts.
- Continuing to discern how to foster community, in person and at times virtually, as we continue to live with the effects of the pandemic and changing worship patterns in society.

Church Council

- We elected Emily Citrone, Signe Johns, and Brad Nederhoff; and we reelected Jennifer Lambert.
- We also offered thanks to Beth Melillo and Ann Sjodin for completing their terms.
- Officers of the Church include: LuAnn Kimker (President), Holly Diaz (vice-president), Susan Pintus (treasurer), and Julie Weeden (secretary).

Nelson Memorial Apartments, Inc.

- We reelected Steve Mischke, Tom Neal, Catherine Sukow, and Larry Yarbrough to the Board.
- We offered special thanks to Geri Nederhoff for her nine years of serving as president of the board. Geri will remain on the board and continue her diligent and caring work with tenant support.
- Officers of the Nelson Board are: Steve Mischke (co-president), Catherine Sukow (copresident), Janice Ostrander (treasurer), and Paul Weeden (secretary).

Benevolence: Also at our annual meeting we shared <u>some</u> of the ways we have given beyond our own congregation:

- \$34,264 given to the New England Synod to support the mission of the wider church.
- Roughly \$41,314 given to support the hosting of Vicars Eric Jensen and Samantha DiBiaso our seminary interns.
- \$3,426 from our annual budget designated for local benevolence was shared with other organizations and individuals beyond our congregation's walls.
- Over \$20,000 was shared through the Pastor's Discretionary Fund including \$5,000 in support of the resettlement family and \$5,000 for Faith Lutheran in Cambridge following a massive fire. Additionally, individuals were helped with food, rent, legal and medical expenses.
