Perseverance

Over the coming month we will be discussing portions of a small book called <u>Perseverance</u>, by Margaret Wheatley.

The author notes that: *The word, "perseverance" in Latin means, "one who sees through to the end," "one who doesn't yield. In English, it describes how we maintain our activity in spite of difficulties. Tenacity, steadfastness, persistence, doggedness these are all common synonyms.*

Recently re-reading this book and thinking of members of our own church community, I was struck by the many challenges people have lived through and/or are facing now, and the blessed examples of perseverance all around us. We have church members who have lived through war, faced the death of loved ones, failed in job ventures, experienced divorce, known poverty, and have made mistakes—yet who persevere. So too we have those among us who carry frailty and illness in their own body, struggle with depression, carry great responsibilities for aging parents and/ or struggling children, shoulder burdens unknown to most others, yet carry on steadfastly.

Reflecting on the witness of these people fills me with gratitude and so I pray, "*Thank you God for such shining examples of tenacity, and for helping so many of us endure times of trial.*"

I am also aware, however, that at times our perseverance wavers. It can be a fragile thing. So I also pray, "Help, O God! Take not your Holy Spirit from us. Send to us wise counselors and give us what at times we cannot muster in ourselves."

I believe that God does offer us help to persevere. Sometimes that help comes through private means like prayer; yet I sense that more often God strengthens us through the love and encouragement of others; others who become the means for God to renew our hope, even when we falter or fail.

This for me is yet another reason why the faith community is so important. Through worship, fellowship, shared service together, (with times of leaning on one another), we provide means for the Holy Spirit to deepen us and strengthen our communal capacity to persevere.

If you're interested in reflecting more on the dynamic of perseverance, author Margaret Wheatley offers some questions to consider. She writes:

Think of all the people you know—family, friends, strangers—who have just kept going, who didn't yield, who were tenacious, steadfast, patient.

- How would you describe them?
- What were some of their traits?
- What was it like to be around them, to listen to their stories?
- At the end of their lives, how were they?
- What do their lives offer you as lessons on how to persevere?
- What do we all need to learn from them now?

Thank you for your part in the First Lutheran community. May God continue to equip us all to persevere.




Adult Forums Sunday 9:15 am

Easter Greetings!

In addition to all the excitement of Holy Week and

the celebration of the resurrection, I've been at work preparing and rolling out the survey portion of my internship project. To help refine my questions and focus the content of the survey, I had conversations with many people from First Lutheran – I tried to cast the net as widely as possible across the diversity of the community, so that many different kinds of voices were being heard.

I pulled the survey together and prepared it for rollout during Holy Week. I received submissions from forty respondents. Though I have not yet fully analyzed the results, here are some initial observations:

1) There is a desire for a variety of social gatherings in the community, from volunteer opportunities to fun and games. (*Note that with that in mind, we are planning a game night for May 11—see column on right*).

2) The diversity of First Lutheran, especially when it comes to intergenerational relationships, is deeply valued here.

3) While the variety of ways we connect continues to evolve, there remains a strong interest in engaging in communal life at First Lutheran Church.

Note, these are only *my* initial reflections – and the real utility of this survey is for its use by *you* across the many wonderful groups and teams involved in our many ministries here. I'm gathering a small team of folks who will help me organize the results so that it can be seen and used by all of us, as we continue to imagine and engage in church together!




Graduates!
